We want to thank all of the donors, visitors, and supporters of our great museum and collection of lighthouses.

Our team has been hard at work refining our selection of artifacts to improve the displays in each of our rooms. A ship model gallery was installed in the museum's lower level this winter. *Kids Ahoy*, our first exhibition designed especially for families, opens in April. On the horizon is the installation of a periscope, with views out over the harbor.

We continue to operate as a non-profit entity partnering with other regional non-profit agencies and community businesses to promote historic tourism. We love that many businesses share logos of our iconic structures connecting the past to the present. This connection of the past to the present embodies our vision for the museum.

What better way to make that connection than to offer tours to all three of our lighthouses, including the New London Harbor Lighthouse on Pequot Avenue. Maintaining lighthouses that range from 110 to 208 years old required capital for their upkeep including safety, structural, and and for the functional areas.

We have designated fees for both Ledge Light and Race Rock to cover the costs of a boat, in addition to the above items. However, we have suggested donations for adults and children to access New London Harbor Lighthouse of \$20 for NLMS members, \$15 for children, and \$30 for all others. Due to the location in a residental area, we want to landscape the site this spring -- an added expense.

We look forward to seeing many of you this year to show you where your donor dollars and membership fees have been spent: to preserve history for today and tomorrow.



Planning for 2019 at New London Ledge Lighthouse

Work already is in progress planning for opening the Ledge Lighthouse & Museum, and making it ready for tours beginning in June. The maintenance and restoration of the 110 year old structure is never ending. 'Being on the water in the open, at the mercy of high winds and storms, every year when we go out to begin our 'spring cleaning' we always have a surprise left by Mother Nature', explained Bruce Buckley, a Museum volunteer.

This year, in addition to the perennial need for scraping and painting, two maintenance projects for the Lighthouse work crew will be: 1.) restoring power (either with an undersea cable repair, or working off the solar grid) plus, 2.) patching and painting the secondary foundation.

The Lighthouse volunteer maintenance crew has been very fortunate to have their work augmented by volunteer work crews from the Navy Base, the Coast Guard Academy, and other volunteer groups. This additional volunteer support is greatly appreciate by all of us that are committed to preserving our richly unique maritime heritage.


